52 days to Exit Day

- "No Deal" is the statutory default
- Political pressure is not the same as legal certainty







If the deal is approved in Parliament

Meaningful vote – 14th Feb??

EU Withdrawal (Implementation) Bill - votes in both houses

CRaG procedure – 21 sitting days









Extending Article 50 under UK law

European Union (Withdrawal) Act 2018

"exit day" means 29 March 2019 at 11.00 p.m.

"A Minister of the Crown may by regulations amend the definition of "exit day" to ensure that the day and time specified in the definition are the day and time that the Treaties are to cease to apply to the United Kingdom"



We're not moving the date of Brexit, but we might add an extra 90 days to February'







EU law

Article 50 of the Treaty on the European Union

Extension

TEU "The treaties shall cease to apply to the State in question from the date of entry into force of the withdrawal agreement, or failing that, 2 years after the notification referred to in paragraph 2, unless the European Council, in agreement with the Member State concerned, unanimously decides to extend this period."

European parliament elections 26th May

Revocation

- CJEU ruling
 - The UK could revoke the Article 50 notification unilaterally, in an unequivocal and unconditional manner, by a notice addressed to the European Council in writing, after the Member State concerned has taken the revocation decision in accordance with its constitutional requirements.







Preparing for all outcomes – deal or no deal

UK Government continue to prepare for no deal

- Over 100 technical notices released
- Over 1,000 new border force staff recruited

BUT... how bad would no deal really be?

- Trading with EU on WTO terms
- Threat of unilateral tariff reduction/abolition
- Technical restrictions on EU trade
- Restricted access to EU labour

Key Questions to ask **your** business:

- How exposed are you to the EU market?
- Is there anything you could do now to limit exposure?
- Have you spoken to your buyer or supplier to discuss their level of contingency planning / preparedness?

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
